From our Minister

Dear Friends

As we approach Christmas, we remember that over two thousand years ago a couple of young people were travelling under orders. Mary and Joseph were obeying a command from a distant Roman Emperor. Augustus had no idea of their existence or their



circumstances. He did not know that Mary was heavily pregnant, that the baby was due any day, and of the upset, upheaval and worry that his demand caused them.

Mary and Joseph must travel to the town of Joseph's family, Bethlehem, to be registered. The purpose of the registration is to establish control over the population. A list of names is needed to ensure that people pay their taxes. A list of names also allows for conscription. Having to travel under this order doesn't sound like good news. Yet it is part of the story of the birth of Jesus.

In our own times, conscription has become a familiar word again, with the war in Ukraine and recent reports of conscripted men fleeing military training centres. Everyone mobilised, voluntarily or otherwise, must stay in the army until the end of the conflict and so many people are affected by the need to obey orders.

Mary and Joseph obey the order they receive. Yet as they travel, Mary carries within her, hidden from sight, the baby whose birth will change everything. He brings freedom from the oppression of government control. He is the new leader who doesn't issue orders but instead encourages challenge. He doesn't treat people as anonymous figures in a crowd. Rather, he offers personal invitations and friendship. He brings as gifts belonging and hope. He helps us in our growing up to become fully ourselves for our own good, for the good of our lives together as a congregation, for the good of our communities and for the good of the world. This is what we celebrate at Christmas time. This is good news.

So, take a moment. Stop and remember what it feels like to meet a new baby for the first time. Let yourself slow down as the wonder and hope and the sheer miracle of new life sinks in. Remember that despite appearances, God is working in hidden and ordinary places to make all things well. 'The light came in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it', is the message that John, the Gospel writer has for us. May it be so for you and your loved ones this Christmas.

It is November now and we are well into our first session of this year.



At our initial meeting we heard a Godly Play story and celebrated communion with Katherine, our Minister. Next, we had a review meeting to discuss plans for the future. This was to gauge how our meetings were going and if there was anything we could do differently.

Two members from the Scottish Fire & Rescue Service based in Musselburgh were our next speakers. This proved to be very informative and gave us some very useful information about safety in the home.

We are looking forward to our next speaker on 25^{th} November; Fiona Waddell from Girl Guiding in East Lothian and also to our Christmas lunch on the 9^{th} of December.

On the 27th October I received an email from Oleg Dmitriev from Sunflower Scotland which he had also sent to Scottish Churches. It said:

We are asking for your help again: when wounded Ukrainian soldiers are brought to hospitals for surgery, their clothes are stained with blood. They are cut off and thrown away. They literally have nothing to wear.

Please help them, and donate bags with hospital essentials. Each bag should include:

- Men's T-shirt (size L preferred) x 2
- Jogging bottoms (size L preferred) x 1
- Toothpaste x 1
- Toothbrush x 1
- Small towel x 1
- Disposable Razor pack x 1

Please put items in a plastic bag. All items should be washed.

I sent this appeal to members of the Guild and congregation. What a response! Once again members of Tranent Parish Church have shown how generous and giving they are.







On the 12^{th} of November Oleg came and picked up the donations that everyone had given. His car was filled with these. He was so appreciative and to be honest I was quite emotional seeing all the donations packed and ready to go.

We managed to gather 38 individually wrapped hospital packs for the wounded.

Sweaters, jumpers, socks, hats, gloves, underwear and toiletries and a cash donation were also sorted and wrapped.

Oleg plans to return again to Ukraine at the end of January. If you have anything that you would care to donate, we will once again be happy to forward donations to him.

Thank you and God Bless you for your support. A quote from Oleg:-Wow I cannot believe it, you are superstars! ♥ ♦ ★★

Remembering Bill Macarthur

Bill was born in 1933 and was raised in Tranent with his two brothers, Bobby and Alec. He attended Tranent Primary and Preston Lodge Secondary Schools, then did his National Service aged eighteen in the Royal Signals, serving for two years in Egypt.

Back home, Bill had a successful career in insurance, notably at Scottish Widows. He retired at the age of sixty before computers came in. While working in Edinburgh, he met Janet, whom he later married. Together, they had two sons, Alan and Alasdair. The family moved several times. Janet enjoyed moving and Bill supported this. They finally settled in Tranent at 4 Viewforth Terrace. Bill loved DIY projects and gardening and helped others with their gardens well into his 80s. He grew tomatoes and made jam for the church.

Bill was a sociable person who made new friends throughout his life. He was a regular at Open House, "a place for free tea, coffee, biscuits, and good laughs" (his words). Bill enjoyed attending the Probus Club and the Local History Society, he loved steam trains and owned a model railway. Ornithology was his other love.

In his many years in Tranent Parish Church, Bill served as an Elder, Treasurer and Roll Keeper. He was very meticulous in these roles and contributed so much. Bill was always impeccably dressed for church in his suit and tie. In a throwback to his National Service days, he insisted on men removing their hats.

Bill and Janet organized the Millennium project for the church pew cushions. Bill designed the patterns on canvas and sourced all the materials from local mills and those in the Borders. The church was then made much more comfortable. When the pews were removed, other churches got the use of them.

Bill had a keen interest in life and in other people. He was always ready with a story and insisted on doing things well and with precision, even in how he served his tea and shortbread. He attended worship into his nineties and his determination and perseverance were much admired. In 2025 he was the oldest member of the MacArthur and McCartney extended families and the oldest man on the church Roll. In June, after a brief illness, Bill passed away and he is fondly remembered and missed by all who knew him.

Fiona's 2025 Greenish Gift Guide

As we draw towards the end of 2025, you may or may not have started making arrangements for Christmas. I try to minimise the environmental impact of my gift giving where possible, in line with my enthusiastic participation in Tranent Parish Church's eco action group. The greener option is sometimes also the more economic option too. Here are my top ten tips.

- 1. Evaluate your gift list. Does everyone in your list really need a gift? While still living out God's call to generous living, what can you reduce in terms of obligatory giving?
- 2. Secret Santa. Is it worth raising with your loved ones the possibility of streamlining your usual gift giving at all? Gifting by household or a draw of names so that everyone gets one quality gift from one person over everyone getting a higher number of poorer quality gifts.
- 3. Focus on consumables. Does your loved one like a particular type of chocolate? Could you pull together a wee bag of nice ingredients to make a slightly nicer-than-usual pasta dish? Why not check out the church's monthly Fairtrade stall for inspiration.
- 4. Experience over objects. So many of us crave quality time with loved ones, which can be far more valuable than a physical object sent in the post. My personal favourites include cinema/theatre tickets and restaurant vouchers and IOUs.
- 5. Gift second hand. Have you got a candle or book lying around that you have no need or use for? Why not pass it on?
- 6. Head to the charity shops. These days many charity shops stock both new and reused items designed to benefit good causes. Make your money work harder.
- 7. Get creative. Can you DIY any of your gifts this year? Those who came to Winter Hub last year may recall the glut of highland cows I stitched up to gift to loved ones and colleagues.
- 8. Get baking. Ok, this is very similar to numbers 3 and 7, but could you combine them to bake a batch of mince pies or Christmas

- cookies? Or even add the dry ingredients to a jar as a "make your own" gift?
- 9. Ask people what they need. It doesn't have to remove the complete element of surprise, but giving someone something they were actually after guarantees a positive response.
- 10. Remember what it's all about. The ultimate gift of Jesus coming to earth as a baby to save the world far surpasses anything we'll be wrapping up in a bow this year.

The Manchester Word Square.

It dates from around 180 AD and was found by archaeologists in a dig in 1978 in central Manchester and is now in the University Museum there.

It has 5 words on it ROTAS, OPERA, TENET, AREPO and SATOR arranged in a square so they can be read forwards, backwards and up and down. One of the world's first acrostics. A translation of the Latin is "Arepo the sower guides the plough with care" but what is even more significant is that the words Pater Noster (Our Father) are hidden within it.

Historians believe it is an early example of a Roman

Christian, possibly a soldier, with a secret symbol of his faith from an era when the church still had to stay hidden.
